GENERAL & LIVESTOCK RULES & REGULATIONS

1. All Exhibitors agree to be bound by the rules and regulations of the Stoneboro Fair.
2. The Fair Management reserves the right to amend or add to these rules & regulations as its judgment may determine.
3. Reasonable care will be taken to protect all exhibits on display from all injury and damage but the Fair is not, in any way, to be held responsible for accidents, loss or damage by water, fire, theft or otherwise, whatever may be the cause or extent of the damage or loss.
4. Entries will be made according to classification.
5. Premiums, as listed, may be given for meritorious exhibits. In cases where there is no competition, judges may give an award such as they deem the exhibit is worthy to receive. The same rule applies where there are fewer entries in any class than the number of premiums offered. The Judges may, at their discretion, award a ribbon or rosette.

The Fair reserves the RIGHT TO DETERMINE how many entries they will accept from an Exhibitor in the same class or, in the case of livestock, the same breed, and poultry, the same species.

THE DECISION OF THE JUDGES SHALL BE FINAL IN ALL CASES except where mistakes, fraud, misrepresentation or collusion — not discovered at the time of the award - are proven. In such cases, the Superintendent, President, or Secretary of the Fair, or such referee as he/she may appoint, may make the decision. The case may be appealed to the Fair Management from whose decision there can be no appeal.

All protests regarding judging must be made in writing and must plainly state the cause of the complaint or appeal. Such protests must be filed at the Fair Office within 24 hours of the occurrence.

6. It shall be the responsibility of the Exhibitor TO NAME PROPERLY THE ARTICLE OR BREED OF LIVESTOCK he/she is entering. Any exhibit improperly entered will be disqualified to receive a prize, but the Judges will mark the correct name on the entry tag so the same mistake in entering will not be made the second time.

Every exhibit accepted for premiums must be given an entry tag which must be plainly marked. In cases of livestock, the breed name must be shown and in the case of poultry the species must be shown on cards that can be identified by viewers. Cards will be available at the Secretary's Office; the Exhibitor is responsible for securing, printing, and hanging cards. The award winners must be placed for show. Failure to comply with this regulation will result in forfeiture of premiums.

7. All entries must have been grown, produced, or made since the last Fair by the person whose name appears on the tag as Exhibitor.
8. Superintendents reserve the right to refuse any entry or bar from competition animals, vegetables, flowers, poultry, products, and manufactured articles of decidedly inferior quality and those not possessing sufficient merit to warrant recognition.

(The Superintendent must notify Exhibitors of any exhibits that have wilted or become unfit. After having done this, the Superintendent may dispose of the exhibit.)

9. The Fair Management may, at any time, order the removal of any exhibit or part of exhibit in bad condition, and any article unfit to show may

be excluded. Food products cannot be polluted with any substances or chemicals that causes them to become poisonous and unfit to be used as food.

NO EXHIBIT MAY BE REMOVED AT ANY TIME BEFORE THE CLOSE OF THE FAIR EXCEPT BY CONSENT OF THE MANAGEMENT.

10. The Superintendents and/or Show Committee have the authority to require the animals to be shown to be inspected by the Judge.

11. During the judging, buildings (except livestock arenas) are to be closed to everyone except Fair Officials, Judges, and necessary attendants.

DEPARTMENT SUPERINTENDENTS MAY ENTER EXHIBITS IN THEIR OWN DEPARTMENTS, but neither they nor any other Exhibitor may communicate with the Judges during the time of determining the awards, except to answer questions proposed by Judges.

Any Exhibitor interfering with the Judges while making awards shall forfeit any premium for which she/he would otherwise have been entitled.

12. All livestock offered for premiums must have been the property of the owner for thirty (30) days or longer. (Livestock or poultry entered under a name other than the owner's shall be disqualified for premiums.)

13. No person shall be allowed in the ring while stock is being judged, except the Judge, Superintendents, necessary attendants, and Fair officials.

14. Should any animal awarded a prize be disqualified, the animals gaining the lower prizes shall move into the next higher position if, in the opinion of the Judges, the animals are worthy of such prizes.

15. Overfitting of cattle will be discriminated against. Any artificial means used to change the form or shape of the animal will disqualify the animal from competition.

16. When on exhibit in the ring, each animal must be under halter and under the control of the owner or the employee.

17. Joint ownership is considered to be as one owner in accordance with registration papers.

18. 4-H and F.F.A. livestock entries are **limited to Mercer County residents only. An exception will be made in allowing out-of-county youth to exhibit in the 4-H showmanship.**

An exception will be made in allowing out-of-county youth exhibiting Polled Hereford animals to compete in 4-H and F.F.A. as members of the Northwestern PA Polled Hereford Association.

An exception will be made in allowing Venango County youth exhibiting draft horses to compete in 4-H and F.F.A. as members of the Venango County Draft Horse Association.

19. No Exhibitor may receive more than two monetary awards in each class.

20. Wednesday, August 30th, will be devoted to the reception and arrangement of articles for exhibition. All articles entered for premiums must be placed in the hands of the Superintendent no later than Wednesday, August 30th, by 9:00 PM. Fine Arts & Rabbit exhibits must be in place by 8 PM on Tuesday, August 29th.

21. The Fair will provide a central sound system. Other sound equipment will not be allowed on the grounds without permission

22. Vehicles and trailers can be parked in the barn area only for loading and unloading; then they must be moved promptly to designated areas.

23. All persons shall leave the Fairgrounds by midnight or within 30 minutes after the close of the last show for the day, whichever occurs later, except those persons assisting with the Fair or with exhibits or displays.
24. All campers on the Fairgrounds must be registered at the Fair Office upon entry to the Fairgrounds. Occupants must register at the office and pay a fee of \$75.00 plus \$12 for each air conditioner, Tent \$40.00. ALL CAMPERS WILL BE PARKED IN DESIGNATED AREAS. Restricted parking for tip-outs will require a double lot. No campers admitted before 10 AM on Sunday August 27, 2023, EXHIBITORS ONLY. An application form is included in each premium book.
25. The Fair and its officers or agents will not be responsible for any accident, loss, theft, or damage to persons, animals, vehicles or personal property which may occur.
26. Persons using alcohol or other controlled drugs or substances or engaged in disorderly behavior will be expelled from the grounds.
27. All delivery people and suppliers are requested to be off the midways by 11:00 AM each day of the Fair, and 10:00 AM on Labor Day
28. Buildings will be open from Thursday after judging has been completed, Friday thru Sunday 10:00 AM to 10:00 PM, Monday 9:00 AM to 10:00 PM.
29. NO PETS, leashed or unleashed, (except for Service Animals) will be permitted on the Fairgrounds.
30. Anyone found on Fair property after midnight without a wristband or proof of admittance will be escorted off the grounds.
31. An Exhibitor of items not requiring an entry fee must enter 10 items in order to be eligible to purchase two Exhibitor Wristbands.
32. All animal exhibitors are eligible for two free exhibitor wristbands. They are eligible to purchase up to 10 additional exhibitor wristbands.

ADVICE TO LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS

1. **The deadline for entries is August 09, 2023. All Exhibitors** must make advance entries. Please mail entry forms to The Great Stoneboro Fair, P.O. Box 215, Stoneboro, PA 16153.
2. All entries must be on forms provided by the Stoneboro Fair. Entry forms can be obtained by writing to Patty Adamson, Secretary, @ P.O. Box 215, Stoneboro, PA 16153 or Phone 724-376-2852 or downloaded from the Great Stoneboro Fair website www.stoneborofair.info.
3. There is to be only ONE entry number per person; be sure you show your number when showing.
4. Upon your arrival with stock, the Superintendent of the Department where you are an Exhibitor will assign the stalls your stock will occupy. **DO NOT** take space unless it is assigned to you. **DO NOT ALTER ANY STALLS WITHOUT THE APPROVAL OF THE SUPERINTENDENT.**
5. If you need any information about the Department, go to the Superintendent. The Superintendents will be found at or near their respective Departments and will assist you.
6. Superintendents in charge of Departments have the right to prescribe dimensions and regulate positions of all signs and direct the arrangement of articles to secure harmony and make an attractive appearance.
7. **DO NOT** lock your stables and leave the immediate area. Visitors pay to see your stock, and you are expected to show it.
8. All Exhibitors are to display a farm or owner's sign to identify their breed or breeds of dairy and livestock and must fill out a stall card to identify each exhibit. Exhibitors are responsible for posting these cards. This is required by the Department of Agriculture.
9. **Labor Day is always crowded; however, livestock and dairy animals may be removed from the grounds after 7:00 PM on the last day of the Fair. Other exhibits may be removed at 8:00 PM.**
10. **ALL CAMPER AND RECREATIONAL VEHICLES MUST BE PARKED IN DESIGNATED AREAS.**
11. **Absolutely NO raffles or games of chance are permitted in the barns.**

HEALTH RULES AND REGULATIONS

All animals admitted to the Fair shall be identified by a unique and permanent ear tag, tattoo, brand, or records of unique physical attributes. Animals known to be infected with or exposed to any contagious, infectious, or external parasitic disease, and animals restricted by quarantine may not be presented for show purposes.

All animals admitted to the Fair must comply with applicable state (7PA Code) or federal (9CFR) rules.

Animals presented for exhibition will be subject to inspection by show officials and will be rejected if evidence of infectious, contagious, or parasitic disease is apparent or if health certification or identification documentation is not acceptable.

All show animals should be held in isolation for at least 30 days after return to the herd of origin.

GUIDELINES FOR CARE OF ANIMALS

It is the responsibility of each Exhibitor to care for animals in a manner that is responsible and ethical. Following are some guidelines for the treatment of animals exhibited at the show.

1. **Restraining Animals**
 - a. Animals should be tied or penned in a manner that will not hurt the animal or restrict its breathing in any way.
 - b. Animals should be tied so that all four feet are firmly on the ground and they have enough room to stand comfortably and lie down.
 - c. Animals should be tied so that they are not able to injure animals tied near them.
 - d. Animals unaccustomed to each other should not be penned together.
2. **Handling** - Any type of rough handling which could harm the animal is prohibited. The use of whips, canes and show sticks should be restricted to showing only and then be used only to guide the animals, not punish them. Remember, animals will respond quicker and better to quiet, gentle handling, rather than loud, rough handling.
3. **Bedding** - All animals should have bedding that is dry and clean. Pens should be cleaned regularly to keep the animals clean and comfortable. If non-traditional bedding such as carpeting is used, it should be regularly cleaned (at least twice daily) to keep the pen free from manure.
4. **Feeding & Water** - Animals should be well-fed and have access to clean water regularly. Realizing that many market animals must have restricted amounts of feed to maintain the proper weight, animals must be fed adequate amounts of feed to meet the animal's basic requirements. Animals not allowed reasonable access to feed and water will be disqualified from the show.
5. **Transportation** - Animals should be transported in a way that is both safe and considerate of the animal's well-being.
6. **Blanket/Sweat Collars** - Any type of material such as blankets or sweat collars should be large enough to permit normal body functions such as breathing, eating, drinking, or lying down.
7. **Health** - It is the responsibility of the Exhibitors to provide proper health care for their animals through routine inspection and consultation with health care professionals. The improper or illegal use of drugs or antibiotics is prohibited. If medication is indicated, be sure to follow the label directions and allow more than the stated withdrawal time.

BIOSECURITY CHECKLIST FOR LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS

No visitors from a country that has animals infected with Foot and Mouth Disease have visited my farm within the previous 30 days.

Certificates of veterinary inspection are current for all of the animals I will be taking to the Fair. All equipment, such as buckets, pitchforks, shovels, rakes, wheelbarrows, manure baskets, lead ropes, halters, nose rings, snares, clippers, scissors, brushes, etc., has been cleaned and disinfected before entering the fairgrounds. (A solution of household bleach in water is recommended for disinfection purposes: add 2 gallons of bleach to 3 gallons of water for disinfecting equipment.)

- ☐ I have received a list of the recommended biosecurity precautions that I should follow after returning to the farm with the animals that were taken to the Fair.
- ☐ Any livestock showing signs of illness, including signs that suggest infection with Foot and Mouth Disease, will be reported immediately to the Livestock Superintendent of the Fair.
- ☐ Any questions about disease and biosecurity measures can be directed to the regional veterinarian or animal inspector, who will be visiting the Fairgrounds for daily inspections.

Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture regional veterinarians will be visiting each fair in Pennsylvania this season on a daily basis. They will be available to answer questions from Exhibitors and will be doing general inspections of the animals and animal facilities.

ALL ANIMAL ENTRIES ARE REQUIRED TO MEET THE 2023 PENNSYLVANIA DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE ANIMAL HEALTH REQUIREMENTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS FOR ANIMALS FOR EXHIBITION AS LISTED IN THE BACK OF YOUR PREMIUM BOOK. **ALL HORSES ALSO REQUIRE RABIES SHOTS**

HEALTH REQUIREMENTS RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. Check-In is Tuesday, August 29, 2023, from 6-9 PM. All equine animals must come through the main gate. No animal will be unloaded until the veterinarian or Superintendent has given the approval upon verifying the required paperwork. All animals are to remain on the premises until September 4, 2023, at 7:00 PM unless released by the Superintendent.
2. The Fair reserves the right to refuse any or all entries, and the right to order any Exhibitor to remove stock for failure to follow rules of the Department.
3. All animals entered must be shown in at least ONE HALTER CLASS and stabled on the grounds and must have met all health requirements.
4. Exhibitors must keep stalls and space they occupy in a clean and sanitary condition and must remove equipment promptly as the Superintendent may direct.
5. Stalls will be awarded based on registration date. There will NOT be a choice of stalls. Moving of stall tags by an Exhibitor may result in expulsion of Exhibitor without refund of entry fees.
6. Stall guards will be required on all stalls for the safety of horses and attendees.
7. If you wish to repair, rebuild, paint, or otherwise improve the condition of your stall, you must first have approval of the Superintendent and Director of Maintenance.
8. Exhibitors must post stall cards.
9. No grade stallions--exception stallion foals. No one UNDER 18 years of age is to handle a stallion.
10. Horses may be purebred or grade but must be shown in the appropriate class.
11. Equine animals are NOT permitted to enter the midway area at any time and must stay off the racetrack. All horses must be led to the exercise area. **Horses may not be exercised outside of the arena.**
12. The order of show will not necessarily correspond to the order of classes appearing in the premium book.
13. No class changes may be made after entry day. NOTE: The same entry number can NOT be in the same class/nor show ring at the same time NO EXCEPTIONS! ALSO: the same horse can NOT be shown in the same class by two different people. NO EXCEPTIONS!!!
14. The Judge's decision is final on ALL shows including 5 minute time limit on gate call.
15. If the number of entries does not warrant all listed classes, classes may be combined, (except champion classes).
16. All 4-H and FFA members' animals must be entered and shown in the 4-H and FFA members' names. All 4-H and FFA youth will stay in the ring at the close of the class for awards.
17. Youth drivers must be accompanied by an adult for safety reasons. All youths 10 years of age and under handling equine animals, must be accompanied by an adult at all times outside of the show ring.
18. All youths (18 and under) must wear an approved helmet, long pants, and hard-soled shoes.
19. Adults must wear hard-soled shoes; no bare feet or open shoes will be permitted. Adults are permitted to help with handlers who are younger than eight years of age.

20. The Judge or Show Management shall have the authority to dismiss any entry from the ring if the entry is not under sufficient control.

Foot and Mouth Disease (FMD)

Foot and Mouth Disease (FMD) is an extremely contagious viral disease that affects cloven-hooved animals, especially domestic cattle, pigs, sheep, and goats. FMD is rarely fatal to infected adult animals, but causes pain and suffering to those animals, which leads to a severe drop in production. The disease can be devastating to the economy of an infected state and country.

The first signs of FMD in animals which are usually noticed:

Lameness

Decreased feed intake

Both are a result of pain from the blisters and sores caused by the virus.

Infection with FMD causes:

Blisters, Fever, Excessive Salivation, Abortions, Decreased Milk Production, Weight Loss

Disinfection

The virus that causes FMD can be inactivated by several disinfectants, including household bleach. It can be killed by extremes in PH (below pH6 and above pH1) by sunlight, and high temperatures, although the virus has been shown to survive single pasteurization at 161.6 degrees F (15 seconds). It can survive in the environment at freezing temperatures: It can survive in the soil for almost a month in cool weather; about three days during the sunny, summer months. It may even live in stored hay for up to four to five months in cool, dry conditions.

Transmission of Foot and Mouth Disease

Although Foot and Mouth Disease does not pose a serious risk to human health, humans can act as vectors for the virus and can spread infection among animals or between farms. Methods of transmission of FMD include:

Droplets: Direct contact with clinically ill, recovered (carrier) animals, or exposed vaccinated animals: Virus particles can be found in body fluids, including urine, feces, saliva, semen, and milk, and also in exhaled breath.

People: The FMD virus can survive in the lungs and nasal passages of humans for several days, and in the tonsils for several weeks. Virus particles are released and can infect susceptible animals when the person exhales.

Clothing: Virus particles can survive on contaminated clothing (the FMD virus can survive for several weeks on clothes and shoes, especially if these articles are dirty).

Other animals: Movement of pets or other animals through an infected area can spread the virus.

Food Products: Contaminated meat and cheese products can spread the virus.

Air: Airborne virus particles might be carried in air currents for up to 40 miles.

DUE TO LIMITED SPACE, MAKE YOUR ENTRIES EARLY.

1. Exhibitors will be expected to display or parade their animals as directed by the Superintendent: (a) to accept the stall assigned without controversy, (b) to keep their animals in an attractive appearance, and (c) to cooperate with the Department in every way that may serve to increase the educational value of the show.
2. It is the responsibility of the Exhibitors of livestock to know when their stock will be judged. Stock must be in the ring promptly on call, and a failure to comply with the order renders Exhibitors liable to be ruled out of competing. Decorations with ribbons or ornaments previously won by animals at shows will be prohibited until after the awards have been made in their respective classes by the Judge.
3. Exhibitors must have all animals listed for competition on the grounds not later than August 30 @ 5:00 PM. All such animals are to remain on the premises until Labor Day, 7:00 PM, unless released by the Superintendent.
4. The Exhibitors will be expected to keep the space they occupy in a clean and sanitary condition and to remove all their equipment promptly as the Superintendent may direct.
5. Dairy Cattle will be shown on Friday, beginning at 8:30 am in the following order: Jersey, Holstein, Guernsey, Milking Shorthorn, Brown Swiss, Ayrshire. Each breed will start with Bull Calf class. All Bull classes in that breed will be shown and then will start with spring calf of that breed and then the entire breed will be shown before moving on to the next breed. At the conclusion of ALL breeds showing the Champions from each breed will compete for Supreme Cow and Supreme Jr of the Show.
6. All 4-H and Open class animals will remain in the ring after each open class is judged for the awarding of prizes in the area of YOUTH CONTESTS. All animals must be entered in the Exhibitor's name and be shown by a 4-H YOUTH.
7. Exhibitors must fill out and display stall cards for each animal. Secure cards from the Secretary at the time of checking entries. Cards must be displayed prior to showing.
8. Have registration papers with you. Some classes will be spot-checked.
9. All 4-H Showmanship will be held on Friday after the type classes are concluded. Participants do NOT have to wear whites; however appropriate attire preferably jeans and Fair t-shirt and boots or appropriate footwear are required. If 4-H premiums are being collected it is mandatory for 4-H Exhibitors to show in showmanship competition directly after the type show on Friday. Exception may only be made by the Dairy Superintendent prior to the show. Exhibitors will be given the opportunity to make any changes or corrections to their entries on Thursday evening from 6-8 pm at the milking parlor. Minimal changes will be made during the show.

MILKING CENTER REGULATIONS

The facilities and equipment at the "Milking Center" are provided for the exclusive use of the Exhibitors of milking dairy cows and are to be used for milking only. There shall be NO clipping or washing of cattle or any other livestock, other than udder washing as a preparation for milking. The Milking Center washing equipment and water shall not be used for any other purpose. No milk from animals being treated with antibiotics shall be introduced into the milking system.

The Great Stoneboro Fair

Any person entering a milking cow at the Fair, by his/her entry, gives the Dairy Superintendent or designee the authorization to sample milk from that cow periodically for the purpose of antibiotic testing.

All milk from the milking center will be sold to a milk handler selected by the Dairy Superintendent with payment made to dairy cattle Exhibitors.

The milking center will be open for use between the hours of 7:00 AM to 9:00 AM, and 7:00 PM to 9:00 PM each day of the Fair with the exception of the evening prior to the show and show day when off-hour milking is necessary for show preparation.

The Dairy Parlor Superintendent shall establish additional rules as he/she may deem necessary and such rules will be posted at the Milking Center.

SPECIFIC WOOL SHOW RULES:

1. Arrival time: All fleeces must be in place by 9:00 PM on Wednesday, September 1st. Entries will be judged Thursday, September 2nd.
2. All wool exhibited must be shorn within 12 months of the show.
3. All fleeces entered in purebred classes must have been removed from purebred sheep recorded in their respective registry association.
4. All fleeces must have been grown on sheep owned by Exhibitor and shown under his/her name.
5. Exhibitors are limited to two premiums per class.
6. All fleeces must be tied with twine or packaged in clear, heavy duty plastic bags. Fleeces containing excessive amounts of foreign matter such as burrs, tags, chaff, straw, etc., may be excluded from receiving a premium if Judge so deems fleece not worthy of an award. Each fleece must be tagged with the following information: Name-Breed-Class.
7. All Exhibitors must claim fleeces at the close of the show. Release time is 9 PM on Monday, Labor Day.

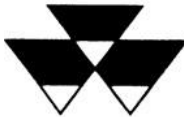

To ensure a cage reservation, entries **MUST** be in by August 9, 2023. Sawdust will be furnished by the Fair Association. Feed to be furnished by the Fair Association, donated by McCartney's Feed Mill, Fredonia, PA, Sandy Lake Mills, Sandy Lake, PA, and Tractor Supply, Greenville, PA.

Since all birds returned from the show are potential sources of infection to other birds, they should be isolated immediately after their return, separate and apart from other birds. This isolation should be maintained indefinitely, if possible, or at least until it has been established that the birds are not carriers of disease producing agents. This may be determined by exposure of a few susceptible birds in direct contact with them.

NOTE: Health certificate forms may be secured from the Department of Agriculture, Bureau of Animal Industry. All birds entered for exhibition shall be free of external parasites (lice, mites, etc.).

***Avian Flu might necessitate cancellation of Poultry Exhibit.**

RULES

1. There will be **\$.50** entry fee on each entry and must accompany the entry blank.
2. Exhibits shall be open to Crawford, Mercer, Butler, Lawrence, and Venango counties. Then if space permits, additional entries from other counties will be accepted on a "first-come-first-serve basis." When cooping capacity has been reached, the remaining entries will be returned. Entries are limited to 75 birds per family in Mercer County, and other counties 50 birds per family.
3. All birds being judged for prize money must be pure breed, with the exception of Capons.
4. All poultry must be owned by Exhibitor for a minimum of 30 days prior to the Fair.
5. A class will be provided for all breeds of Chickens, Bantams, Ducks, Geese, and Guinea Fowl as shown on the breed classification list.
6. Birds will be judged according to the American Standard of Perfection and due consideration will be given to the utility qualities, especially to those varieties that are generally used for commercial purposes.

RULES AND REGULATIONS GOVERNING VEGETABLES

1. In selecting vegetables for exhibition, choose such specimens that would bring the highest market price. Do not select the largest; select medium size specimens. If at all possible, do not mix varieties.
2. The following factors are generally used by an expert vegetable judge:
 - a. Trueness to variety type. If at all possible, pick the specimens from one variety.
 - b. Uniformity in size, shape and color.
 - c. Be sure to pick out the perfect specimen, then select the other as similar to it as possible. Never mix specimens of different maturity.
 - d. Protect from dirt, disease, infection, and mechanical damage. Select specimens that are perfect and show no blemishes of any kind.
 - e. Condition and maturity. Be sure that exhibits are of high quality.
 - f. Potatoes should not be washed. Remove soil using a soft cloth or brush.
 - g. Tomatoes should have stems removed. Carrots, beets, etc. should have tops (leaves) removed leaving about two inches of stems.

PENNSYLVANIA DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE

ANIMAL HEALTH REQUIREMENTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS FOR ANIMAL EXHIBITION, INCLUDING COMMERCIAL EXHIBITION

This document provides the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture's (PDA) animal health requirements and recommendations for all animal exhibitions in the Commonwealth including Pennsylvania County and Community Fairs. All exhibitors are encouraged to check with the management of each fair in advance to ensure compliance with all fair requirements. Each Fair and exhibition will need to abide by the requirements sections for in state and out of state animals and are strongly encouraged to adopt the recommendations based on their own perceived liability and risk for the exhibition and its audience.

Fair management is requested to maintain records and are asked to provide contact information of owners of all animals which are exhibited to PDA upon request. Please note, there are sales slips/records requirements, and documentation needed to move with sheep and goats after a sale.

Important information regarding poultry exhibition cancellations: Due to Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza detections in the Commonwealth, a signed General Quarantine order went into effect on April 16th, 2022. The order, titled 52 Pa. B 2223 General Quarantine Order; Cancellation of Exhibition of Poultry and Their Hatching Eggs Due to Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza, prohibits the display, exhibit or presence of poultry, poultry products, including eggs, poultry parts or any goods or items containing or made up of poultry products such as feathers, or poultry parts at ANY exhibitions or other such venues within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania which receive funding pursuant to the Pennsylvania Agricultural Fair Act 3 P.S. § 1501 et seq. **This order remains in effect until officially rescinded by the Department.** It is the goal of the Department to mitigate this disease threat as quickly as possible to resume normal poultry movements including allowance of exhibition at venues that receive funding pursuant to the Pennsylvania Agricultural Fair Act referenced above. However, at this time we cannot allow resumption of exhibition of any of the above. The Department will be sure to provide notification to the fairs, veterinarians, and stakeholders should this Quarantine Order be rescinded, and poultry exhibitions as listed above can resume.

No poultry exhibitions regardless of their funding, association, or venue may occur within a 10 km control zone of a premises infected with Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza pursuant to Pa. B. 2597 General Quarantine Order, Virus Control for Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza Poultry, Poultry Litter, Conveyances, Feed, Refuse, Containers, and Material Standards, Published Saturday April 30 th 2022. Current Control zone proximity may be checked at the Department's Control Zone Address Checker on the PADLS website by clicking on the following link: Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza ([arcgis.com](https://padeptag.maps.arcgis.com/apps/webappviewer/index.html?id=a9066a3d68a443a08043766cb84bf4ae)) or by typing directly in the search bar:

The following Animal Owner or Caretaker's Verification of Veterinary Consultation Relationship statement for the livestock and poultry being exhibited must be included with a signature line for the owner or caretaker on the fair registration form: "I attest and affirm that a "veterinarian consultation relationship" – as that phrase is defined in the Animal Exhibition Sanitation Law found at 3 Pa.C.S.A. § 2501 et seq. and any amendments thereto – "exists with regard to any animals I will be exhibiting." Animals entering with a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) are exempt from this statement requirement.

For specified events at the Pennsylvania Farm Show Complex, including the Pennsylvania Farm Show, the Pennsylvania All-American Dairy Show, the Pennsylvania State Junior Dairy Show, the Keystone International Livestock Exposition, the Pennsylvania Fall Holstein Show

and the Pennsylvania State 4-H Horse Show, exhibitors will need to consult the 2023 show managements' additional requirements.

PLEASE NOTE There are rabies vaccination requirements for vaccine-eligible animals to be exhibited at the farm show complex ("complex"). For all animal exhibition events held at the Pennsylvania Farm Show Complex building: Animal species exhibited for which a rabies vaccine is labeled for use in that species, shall be vaccinated prior to exhibition in the complex. All age-eligible animals of those livestock species must be vaccinated according to label directions within the 12 months preceding entry to the event at the complex. Market cattle and market sheep that are consigned to slaughter immediately following an event held at the complex are exempt from this requirement. Vaccine-eligible market class animals not consigned to immediate slaughter following the event are expected to comply with the above vaccination requirements. For example, feeder/prospect class animals would be required to be vaccinated to be exhibited and return home.

All rabies-vaccinated animals exhibited at the complex must be accompanied by a rabies vaccination certificate or the vaccination information must be included on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection. The vaccine product administered, serial number, date of vaccination, and veterinarian who performed the vaccination should be correlated to the official ID of the animal(s) or its written physical description and be listed with it on the CVI or rabies vaccination certificate.

PLEASE NOTE: There are ID requirements specific to the Farm Show Complex: Cattle, swine, market sheep (in addition to other ID) and market goats (in addition to other ID) must be identified with a 15 digit 840 ISO-compliant RFID ear tag. The only exception to this will be for cattle who were identified using a 900 series 15-digit ISO-compliant tag placed before January 1, 2015. No other exceptions will be granted. *Please distinguish between 840 tags with RFID capabilities versus 840 tags that do not have those capabilities prior to placing identification in your animal.*

PDA **strongly** recommends that animals returning home from fairs and shows be isolated from other members of the herd or flock for a minimum of three weeks to help prevent the spread of disease and recommends that exhibitors of all animals discuss the health of their animals, including vaccine recommendations and other preventative measures, with a veterinarian on a regular basis. Owners and their veterinarians should carefully check and abide by additional requirements specific to each show or exhibition prior to the exhibition to ensure eligibility. PDA also encourages livestock and poultry owners to register their premises with PDA so they can be contacted in a disease emergency situation. Call 717-836-3235 to register a premises.

Section 1: Pennsylvania Camelids

Requirements:

PDA has no specific requirements for Pennsylvania camelids at fairs. However, fair management has the authority to impose requirements designed to prevent the spread of contagious diseases.

Recommendations:

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1, 2023.
2. All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this should be written on the CVI.
3. Individual official identification (ID). Official ID will have a US shield and includes:
 - A United States Department of Agriculture (USDA)-issued National Uniform Ear tagging System (NUES) tag; or
 - A 15-digit Animal Identification Number ear tag starting with "840"; or
 - An electronic implant device (the exhibitor must supply a reader); or
 - Other official identification approved by USDA (brands and breed registrations with tattoos are not acceptable); or
 - For animals without any of the ID options listed in number 3 above...on the PA Department of Agriculture CVI (Form AAI-113 Rev. 7/18) accredited veterinarians simply need to:
 - Check "OTHER" and write "Camelid" in box number 5;
 - Write the animal's color in box number 14;
 - Record gender in box number 16;
 - Record age in box number 17; and
 - Record either "llama" or "alpaca" in box number 15

*In addition to veterinarians including all forms of identification present on their CVI, they are encouraged to write down any distinguishing markings that are present on the animal or include a photo to accompany the CVI. Questions regarding proper identification for camelids on CVIs for Pennsylvania fairs can be directed to PDA at 717-783-6851.

Section 2: Out of State Camelids

Requirements:

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 30 days prior to the date of importation.
2. Vesicular Stomatitis (VS): This applies to camelids entering Pennsylvania from states that experienced a Vesicular Stomatitis outbreak in the last 12 months. In these cases an accredited veterinarian shall determine whether the animals are free from VS, and animals shall be accompanied by a CVI with the following statement signed by the accredited veterinarian: "All animals identified on this CVI have been examined and found to be free from VS. During the past 90 days, these animals have neither been exposed to VS nor located within 10 miles of a site where VS has

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been diagnosed."

3. All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI.
4. Identification required: A person may not import camelids unless each animal is individually identified by a unique ear tag issued or approved by the state or country of origin, by a permanent tag or unique mark (tattoo) approved by the Department or by some other device or means of identification (microchip) approved by the Department. Questions regarding proper identification for camelids imported into Pennsylvania can be directed to the Department by calling 717-783-6851.
5. Tuberculosis Testing Requirements:
 - No test is required for animals originating from states or zones designated as accredited free by the USDA.
 - All animals originating from states or zones designated modified accredited advanced by the USDA must be test negative within the 60 days prior to the date of importation. The negative test results and dates of tests must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative test report (a copy of the original report is acceptable).
 - All animals originating from states or zones designated modified accredited by the USDA must originate from herds in which all animals 12 months of age and older are test negative within the 12 months prior to the date of importation and the individual animals (all ages) to be imported are also test negative within the 60 days prior to the date of importation and at least 60 days after the negative whole herd test was completed. The negative test results and date of test must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative test report (a copy of the original test report is acceptable).

Recommendations:

All out of state camelids must meet all criteria listed above as "requirements". PDA has no additional recommendations to prevent the introduction of contagious disease from out of state camelids.

Section 3: Pennsylvania Cattle

Requirements:

1. Sexually intact cattle shall be identified by an official ear tag or other unique identification device approved by PDA. Official identification includes:
 - A USDA issued National Uniform Eartagging System (NUES) tag: US or
 - A 15 digit Animal Identification Number(AIN(ear tag Starting with "840" US; or
 - Other identification approved by the PDA (brands and breed registrations with tattoos are not acceptable).
 - ID requirements specific to the Farm Show Complex: All cattle entering the complex must be identified with a 15 digit 840 ISO-compliant RFID ear tag. The only exception to this will be for cattle who were identified using a 900 series 15-digit ISO-compliant tag placed before January 1, 2015. No other exceptions will be granted. If you intend to exhibit at the complex, please distinguish between 840 tags with RFID capabilities versus 840 tags that do not have those capabilities prior to placing identification in your animal.
2. See Rabies Requirements in the General section for animals exhibiting at the Pennsylvania Farm Show Complex.

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Recommendations:

1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1, 2023.

In addition to the identification for sexually intact cattle, all non-sexually intact cattle including steers and spayed heifers should be identified with forms of ID consistent with # 1 in requirements above.
2. All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this should be written on the CVI.
3. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian for animals 3 months of age and older (observe appropriate slaughter withdrawal time). Market cattle consigned for immediate slaughter following exhibition can be exempt.
4. Rodeo: It is recommended that Pennsylvania-origin rodeo cattle of all ages be negative on an official tuberculin test within 60 days prior to the start of the fair unless they are members of and originate from an accredited tuberculosis-free herd. The cattle can be accompanied by the negative test report or the tuberculosis test results can be recorded by the veterinarian on a CVI.

Section 4: Out of State Cattle

Requirements:

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 30 days prior to the date of importation.
2. Vesicular Stomatitis (VS): This applies to cattle entering Pennsylvania from states that experienced a Vesicular Stomatitis outbreak in the last 12 months. In these cases an accredited veterinarian shall determine whether the animals are free from VS, and animals shall be accompanied by a CVI with the following statement signed by the accredited veterinarian: "All animals identified on this CVI have been examined and found to be free from VS. During the past 90 days, these animals have neither been exposed to VS nor were located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed."
3. All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI.
4. Federal regulation (USDA) requires individual official animal identification for sexually intact cattle in interstate movement. Official ID will have a US shield and includes:
 - A USDA-issued National Uniform Eartagging System (NUES) tag; or
 - A 15-digit Animal Identification Number (AIN) ear tag starting with "840"; or
 - Other official identification approved by USDA. (brands and breed registrations with tattoos are not acceptable).
 - ID requirements specific to the Farm Show Complex: All cattle entering the complex must be identified with a 15 digit 840 ISO-compliant RFID ear tag. The only exception to this will be for cattle who were identified using a 900 series 15-digit ISO-compliant tag placed before January 1, 2015. No other exceptions will be granted. Please distinguish between 840 tags with RFID capabilities versus 840 tags that do not have those capabilities prior to placing identification in your animal.

5. Tuberculosis testing requirements:

- ☐ No test is required for animals originating from states or zones designated as accredited free by the USDA.
- All animals originating from states or zones designated modified accredited advanced by the USDA must be test negative within the 60 days prior to the date of importation. The negative test results and dates of tests must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative test report (a copy of the original report is acceptable).
- All animals originating from states or zones designated modified accredited by the USDA must originate from herds in which all animals 12 months of age and older are test negative within the 12 months prior to the date of importation and the individual animals (all ages) to be imported are also test negative within the 60 days prior to the date of importation and at least 60 days after the negative whole herd test was completed. The negative test results and date of test must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative test report (a copy of the original test report is acceptable).

Special Tuberculosis Test requirement for Rodeo Cattle

- All rodeo cattle and bison from out of state must be negative on an official tuberculosis test within 60 days prior to entering Pennsylvania unless they originate from and are members of an Accredited Tuberculosis-free herd within an accredited Tuberculosis-free state or zone. This requirement for rodeo cattle from out of state is in addition to all other requirements listed above for out of state cattle.
6. See Rabies Requirements in the General section for animals exhibiting at the Pennsylvania Farm Show Complex.

Recommendations:

1. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian is recommended for animals 3 months of age and older (observe appropriate slaughter withdrawal time). Market cattle which are consigned to slaughter directly following exhibition may be exempt.

Section 5. Pennsylvania Cervids

Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) program participants: Contact the Department (717-772-2852 or 717-787-4944) for specific requirements for exhibition of CWD-susceptible cervids to remain in compliance with CWD programs.

Requirements:

1. Individual official animal identification is required. Official ID includes:
 - A legible and unique tattoo approved by the PDA or USDA;
 - A USDA-issued ear tag bearing a unique number provided by USDA that utilizes one of the following numbering systems:
 - The National Uniform Ear tagging System (NUES); or
 - The Animal Identification Number (AIN) ear tag bearing 15 digits starting with "840"; or
 - The premises-based numbering system using a Premises Identification Number (PIN) in conjunction with a livestock production numbering system; or
 - An electronic implant device, such as a microchip that utilizes a nationally unique 15-digit animal identification number starting with "840" provided an appropriate reader is immediately available wherever the animal is located.

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Recommendations:

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection issued after May 1, 2023.
2. All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this should be written on the CVI.
3. Fair management is requested to provide contact information of owners of all cervids which are exhibited to Jody Boyer at the Department within 7 days of the last day of the exhibition (717-787-4944 or jboyer@pa.gov).

Section 6: Out of State Cervids

Requirements:

1. All CWD-susceptible cervid species: A written importation permit is required from the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture. Call Jody Boyer at 717-787-4944 between 8 AM and 4 PM weekdays. Call for a permit at least 30 days in advance.
2. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 30 days prior to the date of importation. The CVI shall confirm that the cervid originates from a herd that has been classified as "Certified" in a government-administered CWD herd certification program with components as determined by 9 CFR Part 55.24.
3. Vesicular Stomatitis (VS): This applies to cervids entering Pennsylvania from states that experienced a Vesicular Stomatitis outbreak in the last 12 months. In these cases an accredited veterinarian shall determine whether the animals are free from VS, and animals shall be accompanied by a CVI with the following statement signed by the accredited veterinarian: "All animals identified on this CVI have been examined and found to be free from VS. During the past 90 days, these animals have neither been exposed to VS nor located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed."
4. All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI.
5. Two forms of individual ID are required for CWD-susceptible species (including blacktail deer, elk, moose, mule deer, red deer, reindeer, sika deer, whitetail deer, and hybrids). One form of identification listed below is required as official animal identification. The second device may be either a second form of official animal identification or a form of individual animal identification which is unique to that animal within the herd and which is linked to the CWD database. Non CWD-susceptible species require only the official form of identification; a second form is not required. Consultation with PDA on currently acceptable forms of identification is strongly recommended when anticipating importation of cervids. Official ID includes:
 - A legible and unique tattoo approved by the Department and USDA; or,
 - A USDA-issued ear tag, bearing a unique number provided by USDA that utilizes one of the following numbering systems:
 - The National Uniform Eartagging System (NUES); or
 - The Animal Identification Number (AIN) ear tag bearing 15 digits starting with "840"; or
 - The premises-based numbering system using a Premises Identification Number (PIN) in conjunction with a livestock production numbering system; or
 - An electronic implant device, such as a microchip that utilizes a nationally unique 15-digit animal identification number starting with "840" provided an

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appropriate reader is immediately available wherever the animal is located.

6. Brucellosis testing requirements:

- All sexually intact cervids 12 months of age and older are test-eligible.
- If the animal is from a brucellosis certified-free herd, no further testing is required. The date of the most recent herd test and test results must be included on the CVI.
- If the animal is from a brucellosis monitored herd, it must be brucellosis test negative within the 90 days prior to the date of importation. The date of the test and the test results must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by the laboratory test report (a copy of the test report is acceptable).
- If the animal is from a herd with no brucellosis status, it must be brucellosis test negative within the 30 days prior to the date of importation. The date of the test and the test results must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by the laboratory test report (a copy of the test report is acceptable).

7. Tuberculosis testing requirements:

- Cervids of all ages are test-eligible.
- If the animal is from a tuberculosis accredited herd, no further testing is required. The date of the most recent herd test and test results must be included on the CVI.
- If the animal is from a tuberculosis monitored or Qualified Herd, it must be tuberculosis test negative within the 90 days prior to the date of importation. The date of the test and test results must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative test report (a copy of the original test report is acceptable).
- If the animal is from a herd with no tuberculosis status, it must be test negative on two consecutive tuberculosis tests conducted at least 90 days apart, with the last test conducted within the 90 days prior to the date of importation. The date of the tests and test results must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by the negative test reports (copies of the test reports are acceptable).

8. All cervids: Fair management is requested to provide contact information of owners of all cervids which are exhibited to Jody Boyer at the Department within 7 days of the last day of the exhibition (717-787-4944 or jboyer@pa.gov).

Recommendations:

All out of state cervids must meet all criteria listed above as "requirements". PDA has no additional recommendations to prevent the introduction of contagious disease from out of state cervids.

Section 7: Pennsylvania Dogs

Requirements:

1. Proof of a current rabies vaccination is required for all exhibition dogs 12 weeks of age and older. All rabies-vaccinated dogs should be accompanied by a rabies vaccination certificate.

Recommendations:

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1. All rabies-vaccinated dogs should be accompanied by a rabies vaccination certificate. The certificate must contain the name of the product used, the date of vaccination and the legible name, contact information, and signature of the veterinarian who administered the vaccine. A copy of the rabies vaccination certificate is acceptable.
2. All animals are free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases.

Section 8: Out of State Dogs

Requirements:

1. Proof of a current rabies vaccination is required for all exhibition dogs 12 weeks of age and older. All rabies-vaccinated dogs should be accompanied by a rabies vaccination certificate. Rabies vaccine product used, and date of vaccination shall be listed on the CVI for vaccine-eligible animals.
2. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) written within 30 days of importation. Exemption: a person may bring one or more dogs into Pennsylvania for show or other demonstration without a CVI for a period not to exceed 30 days provided that each dog is equipped with a collar bearing a name plate giving the name and address of the owner.

Recommendations:

1. All rabies-vaccinated dogs should be accompanied by a rabies vaccination certificate. The certificate must contain the name of the product used, the date of vaccination and the legible name, contact information and signature of the veterinarian who administered the vaccine. A copy of the rabies vaccination certificate is acceptable.
2. All animals are free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases.

Section 9: Pennsylvania Equine Animals

Requirements:

1. The Department of Agriculture has no specific requirements for Pennsylvania equines at fairs. However, fair management has the authority to impose requirements designed to prevent the spread of contagious diseases.
2. See Rabies Requirements in the General section for animals exhibiting at the Pennsylvania Farm Show Complex.

Recommendations:

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1, 2023.
2. All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this should be written on the CVI.
3. It is recommended that all equine animals be test negative for Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) by an official test within the 12 months prior to the opening date of the exhibition. Laboratory test results should accompany each animal to its final destination (a copy of the original lab report is acceptable). The CVI shall specify the date of sample collection and EIA test results. Foals less than six months of age accompanied by a test-negative dam are exempt from EIA testing requirements. If

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the foal is not accompanied by the dam, a copy of the dam's test results must accompany the foal to its final destination.

4. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian for animals 3 months of age and older. The name of the product used, date of administration and veterinarian administering the rabies vaccination should appear on the CVI or on a rabies vaccination certificate and this information should correlate to a written description of the horse, and any and all forms of identification associated with the horse- such as lip, tattoos, brands, or microchips.

Section 10: Out of State Equine Animals

Requirements:

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 30 days prior to the date of importation. Please Note: Extended Equine Certificates of Veterinary Inspection and Interstate Equine Event Permits will not be accepted. Brand Certificates will not be accepted as Certificates of Veterinary Inspection.
2. Vesicular Stomatitis (VS) statement: This applies to horses entering Pennsylvania from states that experienced a Vesicular Stomatitis outbreak in the last 12 months. In these cases an accredited veterinarian shall determine whether the animals are free from VS, and animals shall be accompanied by a CVI with the following statement signed by the accredited veterinarian: "All animals identified on this CVI have been examined and found to be free from VS. During the past 90 days, these animals were not located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed."
3. All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI.
4. All equine animals must be test negative for Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) by an official test within the 12 months prior to the date of importation. Laboratory test results must accompany each animal to its final destination (a copy of the original lab report is acceptable). The CVI shall specify the date of sample collection and EIA test results. Foals under six months of age accompanied by a dam with negative EIA official test results are exempt from EIA testing requirements. If the foal is not accompanied by the dam, a copy of the dam's test results must accompany the foal to its final destination.
5. If an equine animal has resided in Texas or New Mexico for a cumulative total of 30 days or more within the six months preceding the date of entry into the Commonwealth, that animal must be test-negative for *Babesia caballi* and *Theileria equi* on a competitive enzyme-linked immunosorbent assay (c-ELISA) test, or a Department-approved equivalent test, with the test occurring within the 30 days preceding entry into Pennsylvania. The date of test and the test results shall be written on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.
6. See Rabies Requirements in the General section for animals exhibiting at the Pennsylvania Farm Show Complex.

Recommendations:

1. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian for animals 3 months of age and older. The name of the product used, date of administration and Veterinarian administering the rabies vaccination should appear on the CVI or on a rabies vaccination certificate and this information should correlate to a written description of the horse, and any and all forms of identification associated with the horse- such as lip, tattoos, brands, or microchips.

Section 11: Pennsylvania Goats

Requirements:

1. Individual official animal identification is required for all goats. Official ID includes:
 - A USDA ear tag with a US shield ; which includes scrapie program tags (animals bearing identification with blue colored scrapie program tags labelled “meat” with a US shield are not permitted to be exhibited in Pennsylvania—please call the department at 717-783-6851 if such a tag is encountered);or
 - A legible tattoo with herd and individual identification recognized in an approved USDA Scrapie database a.k.a. scrapie tattoo (flock ID in the right ear—state postal code and letters/numbers—and individual animal ID in the left ear); or
 - A breed registration tattoo if the animal is accompanied by a registration certificate and the tattoo is legible.
 - Identification used for sheep and goats must be permanently affixed to the individual animal.
2. For post-exhibition sales the following requirements apply:
 - a. Market goats must be documented on sales slips which contain the following information:
 - Official identification (as described above)
 - Sale date
 - Sale location
 - Name, address and phone number of the exhibitor
 - Hauler contact information
 - Destination name and contact information
 - Total number of animals in the shipment
 - Type of goat (i.e. meat, dairy, specific breed)
 - Signature of consignee, agent, or hauler
3. Those slips or a document capturing all of the above must follow the goats to their final destination (including slaughter facilities).
 - b. Goats which are purchased with the intent of breeding and are traveling via interstate movement must have a valid interstate Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (ICVI) prior to movement to the destination state.
 - c. A copy of the sale records slips as delineated above and a copy of any ICVIs (in above) must be kept by the sale organizer/extension for 5 years.
 - d. ID requirements specific to the Farm Show complex: Market goats entering the complex must be identified with a 15 digit 840 ISO-compliant RFID ear tag. This can be in addition to the forms of ID listed above so long as only one 840 ID is used. No exceptions will be granted. If you wish to exhibit at the complex please distinguish between 840 tags with RFID capabilities versus 840 tags that do not have those capabilities prior to placing identification in your animal.

Recommendations:

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1, 2023.
2. All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this should be written on the CVI.

Section 12: Out of State Goats

Requirements:

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 30 days prior to the date of importation.
2. Vesicular Stomatitis (VS) statement: This applies to states that experienced a VS outbreak in the last 12 months. In these cases an accredited veterinarian shall determine whether the animals are free from VS, and animals shall be accompanied by a CVI with the following statement signed by the accredited veterinarian: "All animals identified on this CVI have been examined and found to be free from VS. During the past 90 days, these animals were not located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed."
3. All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI.
4. Individual official animal identification is required for all goats. Official ID includes:
 - a. A USDA ear tag with a US shield ; which includes scrapie program tags (animals bearing identification with blue colored scrapie program tags labelled "meat" with a US shield are not permitted to be exhibited in Pennsylvania- please call the department at 717-783-6851 if such a tag is encountered); or
 - b. A legible tattoo with herd and individual identification recognized in an approved USDA Scrapie database a.k.a. scrapie tattoo (flock ID in the right ear—state postal code and letters/numbers—and individual animal ID in the left ear); or
 - c. A breed registration tattoo if the animal is accompanied by a registration certificate and the tattoo is legible.
 - d. Identification used for sheep and goats must be permanently affixed to the individual animal.
5. Tuberculosis testing requirements:
 - No test is required for animals originating from states or zones designated as accredited-free by the USDA.
 - All animals originating from states or zones designated modified accredited advanced by the USDA must be test negative within the 60 days prior to the date of importation. The negative test results and date of test must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative test report (a copy of the original report is acceptable).
 - All animals originating from states or zones designated modified accredited must originate from herds in which all animals 12 months of age and older have tested negative within the 12 months prior to the date of importation; and the individual animals (all ages) to be imported have also tested negative within the 60 days prior to the date of importation and at least 60 days after the negative whole herd test was completed. The negative test results and date of test must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative test report (a copy of the original test report is acceptable).
6. For post-exhibition sales the following requirements apply:
 - a. Market goats must be documented on sales slips which contain the following information:
 - Official identification (as described above)
 - Sale date
 - Sale location

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- Name, address and phone number of the exhibitor
- Hauler contact information
- Destination name and contact information
- Total number of animals in the shipment
- Type of goat (i.e. meat, dairy, specific breed)
- Signature of consignee, agent, or hauler

Those slips or a document capturing all of the above must follow the goats to their destination (including slaughter facilities).

- b. Goats which are purchased with the intent of breeding and are traveling via interstate movement must have a valid interstate Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (ICVI) prior to movement to the destination state.
- c. A copy of the sale records slips as delineated above and a copy of any ICVIs (in above) must be kept by the sale organizer/extension for 5 years.
- d. ID requirements specific to the Farm Show complex: Market goats entering the complex must be identified with a 15 digit 840 ISO-compliant RFID ear tag. This can be in addition to the forms of ID listed above so long as only one 840 ID is used. No exceptions will be granted. If you wish to exhibit at the complex please distinguish between 840 tags with RFID capabilities versus 840 tags that do not have those capabilities prior to placing identification in your animal.

Recommendations:

All out of state goats must meet all criteria listed above as “requirements”. PDA has no additional recommendations to prevent the introduction of contagious disease from out of state goats.

Section 13: Pennsylvania Poultry, Including Chickens, Turkeys, Waterfowl, Upland Game Birds, and Ratites and Hatching Eggs; and Pigeons/doves

Currently no poultry exhibitions will be permitted at venues or fairs which receive funding pursuant to the Pennsylvania Agricultural Fair Act 3 P.S. § 1501 et seq. until such time the General Quarantine Order; Cancellation of Exhibition of Poultry and Their Hatching Eggs Due to Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza is rescinded (see 3rd Paragraph of General section above). The requirements below should be abided by should the order be rescinded. The Department will notify fairs, veterinarians and stakeholders if the order is rescinded and resumption of exhibition at these venues and fairs can resume.

No poultry exhibitions regardless of their funding, association, or venue may occur within a 10 km control zone of a premises infected with Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (see paragraph 4 in the General section above). Poultry exhibitions may occur at venues or locations that are not within a current control area and do not receive funding pursuant to the Pennsylvania Agricultural Fair Act 3 P.S. § 1501 et seq. so long as the following requirements are met.

Requirements:

1. All Pennsylvania poultry, including chickens, turkeys, waterfowl, and upland game birds entering an exhibition must bear an official PDA-issued leg band. Ratites must be identified with a neck band or an electronic implant device (the exhibitor must supply a reader). Pigeons and doves must bear a unique individual identification leg band but do not have to be identified with an official PDA leg band.
2. An Owner-endorsed Poultry Health Certificate or a Certificate of Veterinary

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Inspection (health chart or CVI) must accompany all Pennsylvania poultry, including chickens, turkeys, waterfowl, upland game birds, and ratites; and pigeons/doves; and hatching eggs. The certificate must include the following:

- Name and location of exhibition; and
- Name, address, and telephone number of the owner; and
- A statement that the entries and the flock of origin are free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases; and
- Owner signature and date of that signature.

- All poultry, including chickens, turkeys, waterfowl, upland game birds, and ratites, (pigeons/doves excluded), and their hatching eggs for exhibition must originate from a flock in which a random, representative sample of a minimum of 30 birds, 3 weeks of age or older, were tested for avian influenza within the 30 days prior to opening date of the exhibition. The birds or hatching eggs must be accompanied by the most recent test report (copy acceptable). Test results must be negative. If there are fewer than 30 birds in the flock, test all birds of age. For waterfowl, cloacal swab samples must be collected for testing, and the swabs may be tested using PCR techniques. Swabs from geese and ducks may not be combined in the same tube for testing.
- Untested birds shall not be comingled with or added to the tested flock after negative samples have been collected and before the show.

3. **Pullorum-typhoid Testing and Verification** (pigeons/doves and waterfowl excluded for exhibition). All samples must be collected by a Certified Poultry Technician or a Category II Accredited Veterinarian.

- Poultry, including chickens, turkeys, upland game birds and ratites (pigeons/doves and waterfowl excluded) and their hatching eggs must originate from a flock in good standing on the NPIP Pullorum-typhoid Clean Program (and there was no break in the chain of ownership by NPIP participants) or from a flock in good standing on the PA Pullorum Equivalent Program. The birds or hatching eggs must be accompanied by the most recent test report (copy acceptable). Test results must be negative. If the rapid whole-blood plate agglutination test was performed, the most recent NPIP 9-2 form (for NPIP flocks) or state equivalent form must accompany the birds or hatching eggs (copy acceptable). Test results must be negative. If birds are less than one year of age and all originate from an NPIP Clean hatchery, they do not have to be tested for pullorum-typhoid if they are accompanied by an NPIP 9-3 form from that hatchery and any additions to the flock were also from NPIP Clean sources. The NPIP number must be noted on the report for NPIP Pullorum-typhoid Clean flocks;

OR

- All individual birds (pigeons/doves and waterfowl excluded) for exhibition (maximum of 300) and birds providing hatching eggs must have had a pullorum-typhoid test within the 90 days prior to the opening date of the exhibition. The birds must be accompanied by the most recent test report, or state equivalent form for the rapid test (copies acceptable). Test results must be negative. The following age restrictions apply:
 - Chickens shall be tested at 4 months of age or older.
 - Turkeys shall be tested at 12 weeks of age or older.
 - Game birds shall be tested at 4 months of age or older, or upon sexual maturity, whichever comes first.
 - Ratites shall be tested at 12 months of age or older.

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- All birds not meeting these age restrictions at the time of sampling are exempt from pullorum-typhoid testing requirements.
- If all of the individual birds going to the exhibit are below the minimum testing age for pullorum-typhoid, at least 10% of birds of testing age in the flock shall be tested within the 90 days prior to the opening date of the exhibition, (Maximum 300 birds.)

4. Testing specifics/Records requirements

- a. Sample collectors and testers must maintain records of animal identification, approved rapid testing, and any other records required by the Domestic Animal Law, and any order issued by the Department for a minimum of two years and must make records available to the Department upon request.
- b. National Animal Health Laboratory Network (NAHLN) protocols for sample collection, including the number of swabs/tubes of viral transport media, and testing shall be followed. All samples must be tested at a NAHLN laboratory. (excluding the Pullorum-typhoid rapid whole blood plate agglutination test that may be conducted at farm)

Section 14: Out of State Poultry. Including Chickens, Turkeys, Waterfowl, Upland Game Birds, Ratites, Pigeons/doves and Hatching Eggs

Currently no poultry exhibitions will be permitted at venues or fairs which receive funding pursuant to the Pennsylvania Agricultural Fair Act 3 P.S. § 1501 et seq. until such time the General Quarantine Order; Cancellation of Exhibition of Poultry and Their Hatching Eggs Due to Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza is rescinded (see 3rd Paragraph of General section above). The requirements below should be abided by should the order be rescinded. The Department will notify fairs veterinarians and stakeholders if the order is rescinded and resumption of exhibition at these venues and fairs can resume.

No poultry exhibitions regardless of their funding, association, or venue may occur within a 10 km control zone of a premises infected with Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (see paragraph 4 in the General section above). Poultry exhibitions may occur at venues or locations that are not within a current control area and do not receive funding pursuant to the Pennsylvania Agricultural Fair Act 3 P.S. § 1501 et seq. so long as the following requirements are met.

Requirements:

1. All poultry, including chickens, turkeys, waterfowl and upland game birds entering an exhibition must bear an official leg band issued by the state or country of origin.
2. Ratites must be identified with a neck band or an electronic implant device (the exhibitor must supply a reader). Pigeons and doves must bear a unique individual identification leg band but do not have to be identified with an official state leg band.
3. An Owner-endorsed Poultry Health Certificate or a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (health chart or CVI) must accompany all poultry, including chickens, turkeys, waterfowl, upland game birds, and ratites; and pigeons/doves; and hatching eggs. The certificate must include the following:
 - Name and location of exhibition; and
 - Name, address, and telephone number of the owner; and
 - A statement that the entries and the flock of origin are free of evidence of

- infectious and contagious diseases; and
 - Owner signature and date of that signature.
- 4. **Avian Influenza Testing and Verification:** All samples must be collected by a Certified Poultry Technician or a Category II Accredited Veterinarian. All poultry, including chickens, turkeys, waterfowl, upland game birds, and ratites, (pigeons/doves excluded), and their hatching eggs must originate from a flock in which a random, representative sample of a minimum of 30 birds, 3 weeks of age or older, were tested for avian influenza within the 30 days prior to the opening date of the exhibition. The birds or hatching eggs must be accompanied by the most recent test report (copy acceptable). Test results must be negative. If there are fewer than 30 birds in the flock, test all birds of age. For waterfowl, cloacal swab samples must be collected for testing, and the swabs may be tested using PCR techniques. Swabs from geese and ducks may not be combined in the same tube for testing. Untested birds shall not be comingled with or added to the tested flock after negative samples have been collected and before the show.
- 5. **Pullorum-typhoid Testing and Verification** (pigeons/doves excluded): All samples must be collected by a Certified Poultry Technician or a Category II Accredited Veterinarian.
 - a. All poultry, including upland chickens, turkeys, upland game birds, waterfowl, and ratites (pigeons/doves excluded) and hatching eggs must come from NPIP Pullorum-typhoid Clean flocks in good standing with the program (and there was no break in the chain of ownership by NPIP participants) and the birds must be accompanied by an NPIP 9-3 form

OR

- b. All individual birds (pigeons/doves excluded) (maximum of 300) and birds providing hatching eggs must have had a negative pullorum-typhoid test within the 30 days prior to the opening date of the exhibition. The birds must be accompanied by the most recent test report (copy acceptable). Test results must be negative. If the rapid whole-blood plate agglutination test was performed, the most recent NPIP 9-2 form must accompany the birds (copy acceptable). Test results must be negative. The following age restrictions apply to comply with NPIP standards:
 - Chickens shall be tested at 4 months of age or older.
 - Turkeys shall be tested at 12 weeks of age or older.
 - Game birds shall be tested at 4 months of age or older, or upon sexual maturity, whichever comes first.
 - Ratites shall be tested at 12 months of age or older.
 - Waterfowl shall be tested at 4 months of age or older.
 - All individual birds not meeting these minimum age restrictions at the time of sampling must come from a flock in which all the test-eligible birds in the flock (up to 300) have been test negative within the 30 days prior to the opening date of the exhibition.
6. **Testing specifics/Records requirements**
 - a. Sample collectors and testers must maintain records of animal identification, approved rapid testing, and any other records required by the Domestic Animal Law, and any order issued by the Department for a minimum of two years and must make records available to the Department upon request.
 - b. National Animal Health Laboratory Network (NAHLN) protocols for sample collection, including the number of swabs/tubes of viral transport media, and testing shall be followed. All samples must be tested at a NAHLN laboratory. (excluding the Pullorum-typhoid rapid whole blood plate

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agglutination test that may be conducted at farm)

Section 15: Pennsylvania Rabbits

Requirements:

The Department of Agriculture has no specific requirements for Pennsylvania rabbits at fairs. However, fair management has the authority to impose requirements designed to prevent the spread of contagious diseases.

While on exhibit or at any time following exhibition, you are obligated to report all mass mortality events and all rabbits who are ill and bleeding from eyes, nose, mouth, or have bloody stools to the department emergency line 717-772-2852 option 1. We need your help to quickly identify and stop dangerous transmissible diseases such as Rabbit Hemorrhagic Disease Type 2 (RHDV-2) from spreading.

Recommendations:

A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI). It is highly recommended that fairs and exhibitions ask that each exhibited rabbit be listed on an intrastate CVI written within 14 days of entrance. The Certificate of Veterinary inspection shall be written by an accredited veterinarian and contain the following statements:

"All Rabbits in the shipment have been examined for and found free of infectious, contagious or communicable diseases including RHDV-2 and there have not been multiple mortality events or rabbits exhibiting hemorrhages within the last 90 days. The rabbits in this shipment have not been housed or exhibited with any rabbits associated with known mass mortality or hemorrhage events."

"In the last 90 days, the rabbits in this shipment, have not been exhibited in, housed in, or traveled to, any state or territory in which RHDV-2 has been diagnosed within the last 12 months. In addition, during the last 90 days, they have had no contact with any captive or wild rabbit which originated from or travelled to one of those affected states or territories."

Please note: Vaccination of Pennsylvania origin rabbits against RHDV-2 is encouraged through a licensed veterinarian. However, vaccination should not exempt the participant from having to adhere to and attest to the above statements on the CVI.

Section 16: Out of State Rabbits

Requirements:

Rabbits originating from a Commonwealth, State, Territory or Country identified as being affected by RHDV-2 within the 12 months prior to the start of the exhibition.

No rabbits or their products, such as meat, pelts, hides, carcasses or other items, and no equipment, exposed feed, forages, or conveyances or other items or associated materials may enter the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania from a Commonwealth, State, Territory, or Country where Rabbit Hemorrhagic Disease (RHD) has been diagnosed in the prior twelve (12) months or there is a reasonable suspicion it exists unless they meet the following requirements:

- a. All live rabbits must be accompanied by an ICVI and must be examined by an accredited veterinarian within the seventy-two (72) hours prior to the date of shipment to the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The ICVI must

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- include statements by an accredited veterinarian certifying that:
- i. All rabbits in the shipment have been examined for and found free of infectious, contagious or communicable diseases;
 - ii. All rabbits have originated from a single premises that has no signs of infectious, contagious or communicable disease in rabbits;
 - iii. There have been no movements of rabbits onto the premises of origin within the 90 days prior to the date of shipment; and
 - iv. The rabbits have had no contact with wild or captive rabbits other than their cohorts in the 90 days prior to the date of shipment.
- b. No rabbits or their products, such as meat, pelts, hides, carcasses or other items, and no equipment, exposed feed or conveyances or other items or associated materials may enter the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania from a premises exposed to, contaminated with or known to be affected with RHD, or where there is a reasonable suspicion the disease exists or the rabbits have been exposed to or infected with RHD.

PLEASE NOTE: Pennsylvania allows vaccination of rabbits for RHDV-2 and recognizes that other states, territories, and countries may also allow the vaccination of rabbits. However, vaccination of rabbits does not excuse the rabbit/ rabbit products derived from /or equipment used for them, from meeting our import requirements in a and b above which are associated with our Rabbit Hemorrhagic Disease Interstate International Quarantine Order.

Fair management has the authority to impose additional requirements designed to prevent the spread of other contagious diseases if they so choose.

Recommendations:

For rabbits that originate from a from a Commonwealth, State, Territory, or Country where RHDV-2 has NOT been diagnosed in the prior twelve (12) months or there is NO reasonable suspicion it exists:

1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI): It is highly recommended that fairs and exhibitions ask that each exhibited rabbit be listed on an interstate CVI written within 14 days of entrance. The Certificate of Veterinary inspection shall be written by an accredited veterinarian and contain the following statements:

“ All Rabbits in the shipment have been examined for and found free of infectious, contagious or communicable diseases including RHDV-2 and there have not been multiple mortality events or rabbits exhibiting hemorrhages within the last 90 days. The rabbits in this shipment have not been housed or exhibited with any rabbits associated with known mass mortality or hemorrhage events.”

“In the last 90 days, the rabbits in this shipment, have not been exhibited in, housed in, or traveled to, any state or territory in which RHDV-2 has been diagnosed within the last 12 months. In addition, during the last 90 days, they have had no contact with any captive or wild rabbit originating from or travelled to one of those affected states or territories.”

Please note: Vaccination of rabbits against RHDV-2 is encouraged through a licensed veterinarian. However, vaccination should not exempt the participant from having to adhere to and attest to the above statements on the CVI should the fair or exhibition choose to impose the above recommendations for rabbits that don't originate from an affected or suspect state, territory or country.

Section 17: Pennsylvania Sheep

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Requirements:

5. Individual official animal identification is required for all sheep. Official ID includes:
 - A USDA ear tag with a US shield ; which includes scrapie program tags (animals bearing identification with blue colored scrapie program tags labelled "meat" with a US shield are not permitted be exhibited in Pennsylvania please call the department at 717-783-6851 if such a tag is encountered).or
 - A legible tattoo with herd and individual identification recognized in an approved USDA Scrapie database a.k.a. scrapie tattoo (flock ID in the right ear—state postal code and letters/numbers— and individual animal ID in the left ear); or
 - A breed registration tattoo if the animals are accompanied by a registration certificate (copy acceptable) and the tattoo is legible.
 - Identification used for sheep and goats must be permanently affixed to the individual animal.
6. For post-exhibition sales the following requirements apply:
 - a. Market sheep must be documented on sales slips which contain the following information: ☐ Official identification (as described above)
 - Sale date
 - Sale location
 - Name, address and phone number of the exhibitor
 - Hauler contact information
 - Destination name and contact information
 - Total number of animals in the shipment
 - Type of sheep (i.e. meat, wool, specific breed)
 - Signature of consignee, agent, or hauler

Those slips or a document capturing all of the above must follow the sheep to their destination (including slaughter facilities).

- b. Sheep which are purchased with the intent of breeding and are traveling via interstate movement must have a valid interstate Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (ICVI) prior to movement to the destination state.
- c. A copy of the sale records slips as delineated above and a copy of any ICVIs (in b.above) must be kept by the sale organizer/extension for 5 years.

ID requirements specific to the Farm Show complex: Market sheep entering the complex must be identified with a 15 digit 840 ISO-compliant RFID ear tag. This can be in addition to the forms of ID listed above so long as only one 840 ID is used. No exceptions will be granted. If you wish to exhibit at the complex please distinguish between 840 tags with RFID capabilities versus 840 tags that do not have those capabilities prior to placing identification in your animal.

Please see rabies requirements for exhibition of sheep at the Farm show complex in the general section.

Recommendations:

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1, 2023.
2. All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this should be written on the CVI.
3. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian for animals

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3 months of age and older (observe appropriate slaughter withdrawal time).

Section 18: Out of State Sheep

Requirements:

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 30 days prior to entry into PA.
2. Vesicular Stomatitis (VS) Statement: This applies to states that experienced a VS outbreak in the last 12 months. In these cases an accredited veterinarian shall determine whether the animals are free from VS, and animals shall be accompanied by a CVI with the following statement signed by the accredited veterinarian: "All animals identified on this CVI have been examined and found to be free from VS. During the past 90 days, these animals were not located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed."
3. All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI.
4. Individual official USDA scrapie animal identification is required. Official scrapie ID includes:
 - A USDA ear tag with a US shield which includes scrapie program tags (animals bearing identification with blue colored scrapie program tags labelled "meat" with a US shield are not permitted be exhibited in Pennsylvania- please call the department at 717-783-6851 if such a tag is encountered).or
 - A legible tattoo with herd and individual identification recognized in an approved USDA Scrapie database a.k.a. scrapie tattoo (flock ID in the right ear—statepostal code and letters/numbers—and individual animal ID in the left ear); or
 - A breed registration tattoo if the animals are accompanied by a registration certificate (copy acceptable) and the tattoo is legible.

ID requirements specific to the Farm Show complex: Market sheep entering the complex must be identified with a 15 digit 840 ISO-compliant RFID ear tag. This can be in addition to the forms of ID listed above so long as only one 840 ID is used.. No exceptions will be granted. If you wish to exhibit at the complex please distinguish between 840 tags with RFID capabilities versus 840 tags that do not have those capabilities prior to placing identification in your animal.

1. For post-exhibition sales the following requirements apply:
 - a. Market sheep must be documented on sales slips which contain the following information:
 - Official identification (as described above)
 - Sale date
 - Sale location
 - Name, address and phone number of the exhibitor
 - Hauler contact information
 - Destination name and contact information
 - Total number of animals in the shipment
 - Type of sheep (i.e. meat, wool, specific breed)
 - Signature of consignee, agent, or hauler

Those slips or a document capturing all of the above must follow the

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sheep to their destination (including slaughter facilities)

- b. Sheep which are purchased with the intent of breeding and are traveling via interstate movement must have a valid Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (ICVI) prior to movement to the destination state.
- c. A copy of the sale records slips as delineated above and a copy of any ICVIs (in above) must be kept by the sale organizer/extension for 5 years.

Please see rabies requirements for exhibition of sheep at the Farm show complex in the general section.

Recommendations:

1. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian for animals 3 months of age and older (observe appropriate slaughter withdrawal time).

Section 19: Pennsylvania Swine

Requirements:

1. No swine species shall be exhibited in Pennsylvania unless each animal:
 - Is accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within 14 days of the exhibition;
 - Is permanently identified by an official 840 series radio frequency identification (RFID) ear tag and the ear tag number is recorded on the CVI;
 - Has been visually inspected and found to be free of signs of contagious disease immediately prior to unloading at the exhibition by an accredited veterinarian or swine health monitor appointed by the fair board or livestock show committee.
 - Swine health monitors appointed by fairs or show/event organizers must undergo annual online training which can be found at the following link: [Pennsylvania Show and Fair Swine Health Monitor Training \(psu.edu\)](http://Pennsylvania Show and Fair Swine Health Monitor Training (psu.edu)) or the following site Extension.psu.edu/Pennsylvania-show-and-fair-swine-health-monitor-training. -Swine health monitors must provide a current completion certificate to the fair or show staff they will be performing monitoring services for, prior to the start of the event.
2. All breeding swine exhibitions are to occur prior to the arrival of any market swine:
 - a. Breeding swine must be removed from the animal exhibition premises prior to any market swine arriving.
 - b. Breeding swine animals for exhibitions shall arrive, exhibit, and depart in a period no greater than 72 hours. Time begins when the first swine arrives physically on the fairgrounds whether unloaded from a trailer or not and ends when the last hog physically leaves the premises on a trailer.
 - c. Swine birthing exhibitions and educational displays in which swine are not competing may occur concurrently with market swine animal exhibition, as long as, reasonable precaution is made to ensure the biosecurity of the swine birthing exhibition or educational display.
3. All market swine exhibited in Department-sponsored market shows shall move as all-in and all-out directly to a PDA or USDA licensed slaughter facility following the animal exhibition and may not be diverted to premises other than a recognized slaughter establishment or a slaughter market in which the sales are designated slaughter-only sales.
4. Non- PDA sponsored shows including jackpot shows and 4-H round-ups, not

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occurring during a PDA sponsored fair or show are exempt from the terminal slaughter requirement only if the following conditions are adhered to:

- a. As is stated above, the swine shall be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection issued within 14 days of the exhibition and shall be permanently identified by an 840 series radio frequency (RFID) identification ear tag.
- b. Arrival, exhibition and departure of the swine occur within a 72-hour window. Time begins when the first swine arrives physically on the exhibition grounds, whether unloaded from a trailer or not, and ends when the last hog physically leaves the premises on a trailer.
- c. There is no public access to the animals other than observation during competitions.
- d. An Accredited Veterinarian or trained swine health monitor visually inspects the animals prior to unloading, and they are found to be free of signs of contagious disease.
- e. An accredited Veterinarian or trained swine health monitor shall monitor and record the health of the pigs daily for signs of contagious disease and the accredited Veterinarian shall immediately report all suspicious disease to the State Animal Health Official.
- f. A Veterinary-client-patient-relationship is established between the show committee/management staff and an accredited Veterinarian, and that Veterinarian is readily available for health monitoring, emergency coverage, treatment, follow up evaluation, and prompt reporting of suspicious disease to the State Animal Health Official.

Section 20: Out of State Swine

Requirements:

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 14 days prior to the date of the show is required. The CVI shall include a statement verifying that the swine have not been fed raw garbage.
2. Vesicular Stomatitis (VS) Statement: This applies to states that experienced a VS outbreak in the last 12 months. In these cases an accredited veterinarian shall determine whether the animals are free from VS, and animals shall be accompanied by a CVI with the following statement signed by the accredited veterinarian: "All animals identified on this CVI have been examined and found to be free from VS. During the past 90 days, these animals were not located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed."
3. All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI.
4. Has been visually inspected and found to be free of signs of contagious disease immediately prior to unloading at the exhibition by an accredited veterinarian or swine health monitor appointed by the fair board or livestock show committee.
5. Individual animal ID – must be permanently identified by an official 840 series radio frequency identification (RFID) ear tag and the ear tag number is recorded on the CVI.
6. Brucellosis Testing Requirements:
 - a. No test required if the animal originates from a validated brucellosis-free herd within a Brucellosis free state . All others must be tested negative within the 30 days prior to the date of importation. The date of test and test results must be included on the CVI.

7. Pseudorabies Testing Requirements:
 - a. No test required if the animal originates from a Qualified Pseudorabies-free herd within a Pseudorabies free state. All others must be tested negative within the 30 days prior to the date of importation. The date of test and test results must be included on the CVI.
8. All breeding swine exhibitions are to occur prior to the arrival of any market swine:
 - a. Breeding swine must be removed from the animal exhibition premises prior to any market swine arriving.
 - b. Breeding swine animal exhibitions shall arrive, exhibit, and depart in a period no greater than 72 hours. Time begins when the first swine arrives physically on the exhibition grounds, whether unloaded from a trailer or not, and ends when the last hog physically leaves the premises on a trailer.
 - c. Swine birthing exhibitions and educational displays which are not competing may occur concurrently with market swine animal exhibition, as long as, reasonable precaution is made to ensure the biosecurity of the swine birthing exhibition or educational display.
9. All market swine exhibited in Department sponsored market shows shall move on an all in all out basis directly to a PDA or USDA licensed slaughter facility following the animal exhibition and may not be diverted to premises other than a recognized slaughter establishment or a slaughter market in which the sales are designated slaughter only sales.
10. Non- PDA sponsored shows including jackpot shows and 4-H round-ups not occurring during a PDA sponsored fair or show are exempt from the terminal slaughter requirement only if the following conditions are adhered to:
 - a. As is stated above, the swine shall be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection issued within 14 days of the exhibition and shall be permanently identified by an 840 series radio frequency (RFID) identification ear tag.
 - b. Arrival, exhibition and departure of the swine occur within a 72-hour window. Time begins when the first swine arrives physically on the exhibition grounds, whether unloaded from a trailer or not, and ends when the last hog physically leaves the premises on a trailer.
 - c. There is no public access to the animals other than observation during competitions.
 - d. An accredited veterinarian or trained swine health monitor visually inspects the animals prior to unloading, and they are found to be free of signs of contagious disease.
 - e. An accredited veterinarian or trained swine health monitor shall monitor and record the health of the pigs daily for signs of contagious disease and the accredited veterinarian shall immediately report all suspicious disease to the State Animal Health Official.
 - f. A veterinary-client-patient-relationship is established between the show committee/management staff and an accredited veterinarian, and that veterinarian is readily available for health monitoring, emergency coverage, treatment, follow-up evaluation, and prompt reporting of suspicious disease to the State Animal Health Official.

Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture Regulations References

2023 Youth Fair Poster Contest

The Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture will once again conduct a statewide poster contest at the agricultural fairs. Participating fairs will hold their own contest and submit one poster from each age group to the state level for additional judging and cash prizes. **Entries must be received by or postmarked on November 1, 2023.**

1. Only one poster may be submitted per exhibitor, per age group. There will be three state competitions: ages 8-11, 12-14, and 15-18. Exhibitors must be in one of these age groups as of June 1 of the current fair season to qualify.
2. The poster size must be either 14 x 22 inches or 14 ½ x 22 inches. Other sizes will not be accepted for judging at the state level.

This year's theme is "**Rooted in Progress**". **Contestants are asked to submit artwork that** reflects the deep roots of agriculture in Pennsylvania's history and the significant innovations farmers and their families have made and continue to make, to grow and adapt as markets, consumers, and resources change.

3. Exhibitors using other themes will be disqualified at the state level.

4. **The fair secretary or contest coordinator is responsible for submitting the poster and completing the entry form for each poster with each age group to the Fair Office.** Please be sure to provide all the information requested on the entry form; incomplete forms will be returned. **The poster and entry form can be given to the Fair Administrator at the PSACF fall zone meetings or mailed to the Fair Fund Office:**

7. Posters will be evaluated on use of the theme, visual appearance and creativity in relation to the exhibitor's age.
8. Premium checks for:

1 st place	\$100
2 nd place	\$75
3 rd place	\$50

These checks will be presented by the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture to the top three individuals. Winners will be notified in advance and invited to attend an awards presentation. ***Participants are required to provide their social security numbers for award disbursements from the PA Department of Agriculture.***

All posters will become the property of the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture for possible future promotional activities for the Pennsylvania Farm Show and Pennsylvania State Association of County Fairs. Any duplication of posters from previous years will be disqualified. Posters will not be returned via mail. Contestants may arrange to have their entries returned following the PA Farm Show through their individual fairs; however, the posters must be picked up in person at the PSACF Convention or Spring Zone Meetings.
